### **BEST PRACTICE - 01**

# 1. Title: - Improving Health status (Nutritional Value) through Forest raw materials. Practice by Home-economics Department.

#### 2. Goal:-

To provide healthy food habits and nutritional values to the students belonging to tribal belt who are suffering from Malnutrition.

### 3. Context:-

Health is the most important issue for women in particular and for all in general. Women students studying in our college belong to tribal, backward and poor economic background. They are not aware about the healthy food habits and nutritional values. So, the Home-economics department of the college wants to give them knowledge about the raw materials and their nutritional value that are present in the forest and how they can make them useful for their dietary purposes. As we know that women is the nucleus of the family and she has to take care of everybody so it is necessary to give her knowledge of nutritious diet available easily and of low cost.

### 4. Objectives:-


- Our primary aim is to give knowledge to the students about the nutritional values of raw materials present in the forest area and how to make use of them and inclusion of those items in their diet.
- 2. The area in which our college is situated is tribal. Most of the girls are coming from poor family background due to lack of money they are not able to take healthy diet that constitutes of elements of high cost. So they are suffering from Malnutrition.
- 3. Our secondary aim is that, the practice taken by the college should be included in the syllabus of class B.A.II year semester-IV.

### 4. The Practice:-

### I) PREPERATION OF JAM FROM MAHUA FLOWERS:

Work on preparation of Jam from Mahua flowers was carried out in Laboratory.

### **Processing Flow – chart for Preparation of Jam:**



### Steps Involved in Preparation of Jam

- 1. The Mango fruits and Mahua flowers were procured from market.
- 2. Fruits were sorted, graded on the basis of its size, shape and maturity.
- 3. Then the fruits were washed with clean water.
- 4. Fruit was then peeled by peeler or done manually. The peeled fruit was then kept in 1 % brine solution to prevent browning of fruit by oxidation if required.
- 5. The peeled fruit was then cut into slices.
- 6. Then, cut fruit was put in pulper or processor to extract the pulp from the fruit.
- 7. Then, processing was carried out i.e. After the pulping was completed, to this pulp, mahua flower extract and calculated amount of sugar was added by keeping some quantity aside and water was added if required.
- 8. Then boiling was carried out with continuous stirring.
- 9. Once the TSS reaches above 60°B then addition of pectin, citric acid and remaining amount of sugar was added.
- 10. The, it was heated till the brix reaches 1-2 % less than that of desired brix. Then the heating was stopped and whole mass was allowed to cool.
- 11. Then the jam was filled into sterilized glass bottles.
- 12. The bottles were cooled.
- 13. After the jam was cooled, capping was done and then bottles stored at refrigerating temperature.



### II ) PREPARATION OF SQUASH FROM MAHUA FLOWERS

Squash is a type of fruit beverage containing moderate quantities of fruit pulp or juice where sugar is added for sweetening.

Flow - Chart for Preparation of Squash



#### **Steps Involved:**

- a. Dried Mahua flowers were taken.
- b. Flowers were washed with clean water to remove soil, dirt, dust particles.
- c. Flowers were soaked in water at proportion of sample A (1:5) & sample B (1:10) as (flower: water) ratio for a period of 1 hour.
- d. After soaking, juice was extracted and filtered through muslin cloth.
- e. After filtration, for getting clear extract, juice was centrifuged at 10,000 rpm for 10 minutes to get clear transparent juice.
- f. Juice obtained was measured.
- g. Then prepare sugar syrup having 72 °B.
- h. Mixing of calculated amount of sugar syrup to Mahua juice.
- i. After that, calculated amount of citric acid was added.
- j. Lastly to the squash, preservative as SO<sub>2</sub> source, potassium Metabisulphite at 350 ppm was mixed into squash.
- k. Then filtering was done in bottles.
- 1. Bottles were stored at refrigeration temperatures.

#### **Proximate Composition for Sun dried Mahua Flower:**

#### 6. Problems Encountered and Resources:

From the side of students we don't face any problem but as we want this practice should be included in the syllabus it requires some efforts. We have organized a workshop in which we have invited Vice-chancellor and member of Board of study of Gondwana University. This practice is shown before them and its advantages were also discussed by them.

#### **BEST PRACTICE - 02**

# 1. Title :- Swayamsiddha (Self dependent Women) Practice by Physical Education department

### 2. Goal & Objective: -

In year 2001 State Sports department and youth wing has plan a programme for Women Empowerment.

following are its objectives:

- a) To develop self confidence in the local community suffering from the feeling of insecurity.
- b) To provide self-defence training for women.
- c) To make them aware about the laws in constitution and boost their physical fitness.
- d) To provide them knowledge of balance diet and safety measures.
- e) Training is open for both educated an uneducated women.

#### 3. Context:-

Our College is the only women college in the district when this centre was established in Gadchiroli district it was under developed and the condition of women was worse, so our college was the first one to conduct this training programme in 2003.

#### The Practice:-

### Establishment of Swayam Siddha Centre in Mahila Mahavidyalaya:-

First step involved in this practice is establishment of Swayam Siddha centre in Mahila Mahavidyalaya on 26<sup>th</sup> August 2003 under which training is provided to women. It is not only for college students but also for working and uneducated women. The training programme was planned by Maharashtra Judo association and tricondo association. On state level ten technicians and thirty masters were appointed. They have given training to sport department head Dr. Anita Lokhande and she became Master trainer for this training programme. She has provided training to 100 women which aims at all around personality development of women. Our college has organize this training six years i.e. from 2003 to 2009, and for wider results training is organized at different places now in which our

students become participants and our sports department head Mrs. Anita Lokhande provide training to participants for one month and there is a special camp for 10 days in between the training.

#### **Evidence of Success:**

This training programme was first time conducted in 2003 and Even now in 2017the training programme was conducted. Every year we conduct this training for women number of participants may vary from one year to another but the significance of the training remains same. This training gives women self confidence and courage to face the challenges of life.

### **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:**

- 1. It is difficult to maintain regularity of participants because working women are also part of training.
- 2. There is no uniformity in the group because some women are students (age group 18-22) some are working women (age group 25-30) and some are uneducated and belong to labour class (age group 30-40) so it is difficult to maintain the group for different activities during the training.
- 3. There is no provision for stipend for the participants specially needed to labour class women.
